A program on The History of the Winnebago County Courthouse was presented by Austin Frederick.


A door prize drawing was held and following the meeting, guests were invited to Morgan House for light refreshments and tours of the historic home once belonging to John R. Morgan.

Your Historical Society at Work




The Knaggs Ferry historical marker was placed in Rainbow Memorial Park by this society in 1955.

CIVIL WAR TOKENS OF WINNEBAGO COUNTY

PART THREE

(This article is a continuation of research and collaboration with my friend and mentor Larry Spanbauer, who passed away September 4, 2018. As many of you know, Larry was a treasured Oshkosh historian. What you may not know, is that he was also a highly respected numismatist. I write this in his memory.)





B.H. SOPER, DEALER IN FURNATURE, OSHKOSH, WIS. Three die varieties are known for the back of this token (Bust w/Phrygian hat), (Head of Hermes w/stars), (Flying eagle left w/date)

B. H. Soper started business in Oshkosh in 1855 under the name Soper & Barker. In 1857 Soper bought out Barker and became sole owner. Located at No. 10 Kansas Street about a block from the river, the business thrived and in 1867 he built an elegant three-story store at No. 23 Main Street, still retaining the property on Kansas St. for the purpose of custom manufacturing of furniture of all kinds and items for the burial trade: caskets, coffins, and burial cases. Here he also kept a splendid hearse for the purpose of "Undertaking to order on short notice". B. H. Soper & Company remained in business into the 1900's. Soper died in 1909 at age 82.





H. RANS, DEALER IN CLOTHING, OSHKOSH, WIS.
Three die varieties are known for the back of this token
(Bust w/Phrygian hat), (Head of Hermes w/stars), (Head of Hermes w/o stars)

So far, we are unable to locate information about the H. Rans Clothing store. But surprisingly there is a reference to the token itself in a March 1937 issue of the Oshkosh Daily Northwestern. A gentleman in North Dakota had one of these tokens and offered it to any descendant of H. Rans who came forward. No one did.





WM. L. WILLIAMS, CHEMIST AND DRUGGIST, 43 FERRY ST, OSHKOSH, WIS.

William L. Williams advertised regularly in directories and newspapers. He resided at 43 Ferry Street, 'opposite the Bank of Oshkosh'. He was a Chemist and Druggist dealing in Paints, Oils, Varnishes, Glass, Putty, Dye Stuffs, and Family Dyes. Also, Stationary, Perfumery, and 'Fancy Goods'.

In one ad he thanks his customers in the eloquent language of the times:

"The subscriber takes this opportunity of tendering his thanks to his numerous friends and patrons, for their liberal support during the past fifteen years, and hopes by strict personal attention to merit a continuance of the same".





ALLEN VOSBURG & CO., MUSIC STORE, OSHKOSH, WILS. STEINWAY'S PIANOS, SMITH'S MELODEONS & TREMOLO HARMONIUMS.

Limited (but interesting) information exists for the Allen Vosburg Music Store. The 1866 City Directory lists an A. K. Vosburg as an Artist, living on Merritt Street. We do not believe this is the Vosburg from the Music Store. The reference 'Commemorative Biographical Record of the Fox River Valley Counties of Brown, Outagamie, and Winnebago' offers a George Vosburg – we believe this is our man. Born in 1839, George came to Oshkosh at age 8, received formal education at Hillsdale, Michigan Academy and returned to Oshkosh around 1861 to open a Music and Musical Instrument business. He married Louisa C. Allen, whom we speculate accounts for the Allen in the business name 'Allen Vosburg', although this would have been unusual for the times.

The business only lasted about two years.

The reverse die on this token is also unusual in that it mentions two brand name musical instrument companies: Steinway, and Smith. The Smith instruments, melodeons and harmoniums are small keyboard-style reed organs; the tremolo is a paddle-wheel device that stirs the air over a bank of reeds and imparts a wavering or tremolo effect.

CONCLUSION

These Civil War Tokens are a historic reminder of life during the Civil War Era, a time when Oshkosh was in its early developing years. The information here is incomplete, as more research may uncover interesting facts about each proprietor and their business.

If readers should have any information regarding the businesses or proprietors in this article the author would be very appreciative to receive it.
